FIRST QUARTER COMMENTARY

The Robinson Tax-Advantaged Income Fund (the "Fund"), as measured by the Fund's Institutional Class (ROBNX), returned 4.65% in the first quarter of 2021, outpacing its benchmark, the Barclays 1-10 Year Municipal Blend Index, which returned a negative 0.21% for the quarter. For the trailing 1-year period the Fund was up 19.02% versus the benchmark's 4.39% return. Following is the first quarter attribution analysis for the Fund relative to its benchmark index:

The Fund seeks to neutralize the impact changes that risk-free interest rates may have on the underlying holdings of the tax-exempt closed-end funds it holds. The Fund does this through carefully weighted short positions in various US Treasury bond futures contracts. The net result is to isolate, as much as practical, the inherent credit spreads of the underlying investment grade portfolio of municipal bonds. That proved to be a major contributor, again, in the first quarter, as credit spreads in the underlying municipal bond market continued to narrow. While municipal bond yields widened a modest 0.11% for the quarter, the yield on the 10-year Treasury note increased 0.83%. The net result was that our holdings in tax-exempt closed-end funds managed to eke out a positive 0.38% NAV return for the month while our interest rate risk hedges were up 2.73%. The Fund also benefited from narrowing of tax-exempt CEF discounts, which added another 1.08% to the return. Lastly, our goal each quarter is to at least cover the Fund's expenses through superior security selection—we more than accomplished our goal this quarter as security selection contributed a positive 0.77% to the Fund's return.

We expect some skepticism when we suggest the future for a strategy that just returned 14.6% more than its benchmark over the past year remains bright. But we are simply following the Fed's guidance. The longer the Fed keeps short-term rates pinned at zero, and they continue to state publicly they don't anticipate raising rates prior to 2023, the more certain we are that CEF discounts will become premiums as they did the last time the Fed was pinned at zero for an extended period of time. From 12/31/09 through 12/31/12 the tax-exempt CEF universe averaged a premium of 1.4%--the current weighted average discount of the Fund's holdings of tax-exempt CEFs is -6.1%.

What we didn't have back then was aggressive fiscal stimulus to accompany monetary policy. Even before the current administration's American Rescue Plan, we had the CARES Act and then subsequent extensions of unemployment benefits, PPP loans and additional stimulus checks. That backdrop alone provided an ideal environment for municipal bond investors; and, now we have the administration pushing for an infrastructure spending package. There is no question that infrastructure spending has huge bipartisan support. What is considerably less bipartisan is how to pay for it. There are those who would prefer to raise taxes on corporations and the wealthy, and there are others who view infrastructure spending as a long-term capital expenditure which should be financed with longer-term debt (US Treasuries). We believe the Robinson Tax-Advantaged Income Fund is poised to benefit either way: higher taxes will make municipal bonds and tax-exempt CEFs that much more attractive; or, financing the spend with more issuance of long-term Treasury bonds will enhance the value of the Fund's hedges. Following are our top 5 reasons for WHY NOW for the Robinson Tax-Advantaged Income Fund:

- 1. **Higher Income:** the Fund's distribution yield is 2% higher than the yield available in the overall municipal bond market.
- 2. **Upside Potential:** as tax-exempt CEF discounts move to premiums, we believe the Fund's weighted average discount of 6.1% may provide upside.
- 3. **Improved Credit:** the recently passed American Rescue Plan stimulus package greatly shored up state and local finances.
- 4. **Competitive Edge**: whether infrastructure spending is paid for with higher taxes or more Treasury issuance, our strategy has benefited.
- 5. **Sustainability:** the Fund's hedging strategy has allowed it to generate higher income and monetize discounts whether rates were rising or falling.
