GRAMERCY EMERGING MARKETS DEBT FUND

MONTHLY COMMENTARY

April was marked by significant volatility in global financial markets, primarily triggered by the U.S. Administration's imposition of sweeping tariffs on April 2. This move, termed "Liberation Day," led to a sharp sell-off in U.S. equities, with the S&P 500 and Nasdaq Composite entering bear market territory after losing over \$6 trillion in value within two days. The CBOE Volatility Index (VIX) spiked to levels not seen since 2022, reflecting heightened investor anxiety. Bond markets also experienced turmoil, with the 10-year U.S. Treasury yield initially dropping to 3.99% before surging to 4.48% mid-month amid concerns over rising inflation and fiscal policy uncertainty. In contrast, European markets demonstrated resilience bolstered by a stronger euro and relatively stable bond yields. The month concluded with a partial recovery in U.S. equities, as investors speculated on potential tariff rollbacks and exemptions, though uncertainty remained prevalent. The 10-year U.S. Treasury yield closed the month relatively flat at 4.18%, while the 30-year US Treasury yield increased 13 basis points (bps) to 4.70%. Gold ended the month up 3.74% at \$3,250. Simultaneously, the U.S. dollar weakened with the U.S. Dollar Index (DXY) falling from 104.21 to 99.47 as global investors sought to diversify their assets outside of the U.S. dollar.

In terms of return streams, emerging market (EM) hard currency corporate bonds, as measured by the CEMBI Broad Diversified Index, underperformed in April with a return of -0.43%. This was primarily due to a sharp sell-off in the high-yield segment, which declined by -1.10%, while the investment-grade portion posted a modest gain of 0.05%. EM hard currency sovereign bonds, tracked by the EMBI Global Diversified Index, also saw a modest decline of -0.22%, driven by a -0.58% drop in high-yield sovereigns, partially offset by a 0.15% gain in the investment-grade segment. In contrast, EM local currency sovereign bonds, represented by the GBI-EM Global Diversified Index, outperformed, returning a strong 3.25% for the month, supported by ongoing U.S. dollar weakness that boosted local currency performance.

In April, performance was primarily influenced by our underweight position in emerging market local currency sovereigns, which saw gains due to continued U.S. dollar weakness. Lower-beta local currency credits, such as Poland, Malaysia and Thailand, which typically offer limited upside, benefited strongly from this dynamic. The Fund's exposure to certain better quality, albeit more on-the-run, high-yield oil and gas credits, both in the sovereign and corporate space, also detracted from performance as oil prices fell on the back of demand fears coupled with concerns over increased Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) supply. These headwinds were partially mitigated by our positions in higher beta local currency sovereign bonds, such as Brazil, our overweight exposure to certain idiosyncratic stories, such as Ecuador, and our exposure to defensive investment-grade corporate credits in the Middle East. Volatility is expected to remain high amidst an uncertain macro environment and higher prospects of a U.S. recession that would have a broader impact on overall risk appetite.
